Introduction: Earth can be divided into four systems. The **atmosphere** is the air above Earth's surface. The **hydrosphere** is composed of all of Earth's water. Within the hydrosphere is the **cryosphere**, which is all the frozen water on Earth. The **geosphere** is the rocky, non-living part of Earth. The **biosphere** consists of all living things, including people. Some scientists use the term "anthroposphere" to describe everything made or modified by humans.

Question: How does carbon move between the atmosphere, hydrosphere, biosphere, and geosphere?
