Part One:

Use the website to make one of the following products:

- Pamphlet
- Poster
- Booklet

You must show the following information for your country:

- Name
- Capital
- Population
- Area in square miles and kilometers
- Literacy Rate
- Life Expectancy (male/female)
- Mortality Rate
- Climate Description
- Physical Features Description
- Large Cities
- 3-5 Historical Facts
- 3-5 Facts about the People
- 3-5 Customs/Courtesies
- 3-5 Facts about their lifestyle
- 3-5 Facts about their Society
- Embassy Address (if provided)
- Flag (printed from home or hand drawn is fine)

Part Four:

Compare/Contrast Chart or Graph

Use the Graphs & Charts Feature of CultureGrams to create a chart or graph to compare/contrast data. You need to use your country, one other from the same region in Africa, and the United States (3 only). Print. See Mrs. Mills for permission.

Part Two:

Create a nameplate for your country.

Using the name of your country, create a nameplate that represents information from that country. For example, if you were doing the United States, the U could be made up of stars, the N made up of mountains/valleys, the I could be the Statue of Liberty, and so on. They need to be pictures/symbols of things that country has or represents. Make a list of the items you could use first. Use your CultureGram information to help you create the list.

Create your nameplate on the large white paper provided. It does not have to be colored, but you MUST draw in pencil. No ink. You can color in colored pencil only. No markers or crayons.

Part Three:

Letter to the Embassy

Write a letter the embassy of your country requesting educational materials about their nation. Let them know who you are, what we are studying, what you would like to know, etc. Be polite, and use appropriate grammar/language. No text language.

This must be proofread by Mrs. Mills before submitting. We will mail these letters to the embassy in hopes of receiving some response. There are no guarantees, but we will hope for the best.

For this part, every student needs to bring in \$0.50 to buy one stamp or bring in a stamp to mail your letter. I will provide the paper and envelopes for the letters.
